


Literary Clue



Goal:

To correctly name the person who did it, the object and the location.

Setup:

Sort the posters by type and shuffle each pile of posters face-down.

Without looking, take one suspect poster, one object poster and one location poster, and slide them into an envelope. Put this up in the library marked with the word 'confidential'.

Select 6 spaces in the school.

Mark these in the room box on the map provided. For example, Hogwarts may be in the canteen. You may wish to decorate the rooms thematically or just project the image from our poster up on the whiteboard.

Shuffle the rest of the posters together, and hide two to three posters in each of the rooms.

Provide the map to each student and the game begins.

Play:

Students make their way to each space in the school. When they enter, they look for the posters, ticking any they find off the checklist that can be found on the map.

Students finish by writing their name and their suggestions of who did it, where and with what in the box on their map. They submit this for a chance to win a prize.

The results:

Be sure to make the announcement of who did it, where and with what object in assembly. You may then wish to launch a creative writing competition: write the short story of how this happened. If it was Alice, with the Elder Wand in Panem, have them write about the incident.

Choose the best story and use the teacher made quiz option in Accelerated Reader™ and the ATOS Analyser to level the piece of student writing and create a short Accelerated Reader quiz that all students can take.

**If you wish to play a more challenging version of the game, you can have the teacher in the room holding copies of all the posters in play and the students can make a suggestion. To do this, the student would name a suspect, an object and the place just entered. For example, if the student just entered Oz, he or she might say, "I suggest the crime was committed by Katniss, in Oz, with a sword called Sting." The teacher can then disprove any of the student's suggestion by showing one of the posters.*


